FIRST FEMALE DEFENCE ATTACHÉ

ieutenant Colonel (U) Hjh Suriani binti Haji Junaidi began her career in the military on 7 September 1993 when she was enlisted as a potential Officer Cadet in the Royal Brunei Armed Forces (RBAF). She was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant on 14 January 1995.

Lieutenant Colonel (U) Hjh Suriani's first tour of duty was as a Berakas Platoon Officer under the Women's Company. She was attached at the Royal Brunei Armed Forces Commander's office for almost one year as a Staff Officer Grade 3 before being posted to the Royal Brunei Land Forces as a Staff Officer Grade 3 Logistics from December 1996 to January 2000. In December 1999, she was promoted to a Captain. She was the Staff Officer Grade 3 at the Combat Development and Operational Development (presently Directorate of Force Capability Development) from 2000 to 2001 and later posted as a Training Officer of the Recruit Company, Training Institute from 2002 until 2004.

She was promoted to the rank of Major in December 2003 and later posted to The Royal Brunei Air Force from 2005 until 2013 holding three different appointments; Staff Officer Grade 2 Training, Acting Officer Commanding of Air Technical Training School and Staff Officer Grade 2 Inspectorate, Air Force.

While serving in the RBAF, she has attended several courses both locally and overseas. She has also participated in the inaugural Command and Staff Course in Brunei from November 2010 to August 2011 and has also attended the 13th Executive Development Programme in 2016.

Lieutenant Colonel (U) Hjh Suriani was the Staff Officer Grade 2 J7 (Training) of the Joint Force Headquarters from January 2014 to October 2015, the first lady officer to take the role of Mindef Spokesperson from November 2015 to 2017 and the Assistant Chief of Staff, Royal Brunei Airforce in 2017 before having been posted to Thailand as the Brunei Defence Attache in December 2018.

She was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in November 2015 and has a keen interest in Volleyball.

She has been attributed as the first Female Defence Attache in the Royal Brunei Armed Forces and for that she has said that she felt truly privileged and thankful for the honour as it is a rare opportunity to have been given this role. She takes pride in that status but also humbled by the responsibility that it carries. The

challenges she faces further fuels her determination to always do her best to contribute towards the progress in the roles and responsibilities of the Defence Attache Office. She hopes to inspire other female officers as well as strengthen the role of female officers and promoting their advancement in this organization.

Holding the post as a Defence Attache, She has found that it is important to continuously foster good communications to try to understand their culture and negotiate with her counterparts in Thailand as well as other Defence Attaches. Trust and confidence amongst Defence Attaches here are promoted through the regular conduct and attendance of a wide range of activities such as receptions, discussions, and meetings, Defence Attaches' Tour etc.









WOMEN IN DEFENCE

Ms. Ampuan Yura Kasumawati Bte DP Hj Mohd Adnan is a senior research officer in Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Institute of Defence and Strategic Studies (SHHBIDSS) also serves as the head of the Research Division in the Institute. As an officer in MINDEF's think tank, she prepares and presents papers in Track 2 engagements in which her main research interests covers regional and security issues in particular ASEAN and maritime security. Operationally, she provides the yearly planning and ensure delivery of research outputs including papers and its activities and also identify priority Track 2 engagements and training opportunities for the Research Division. Overall, she has served for over 20 years being in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs as a diplomatic officer from 1999 and in Ministry of Defence from late 2009.

What is it like being a woman working in a field that is predominantly seen as a male territory @ relating to women in defence?

Having been working for over 20 years, being in Defence has been a further enriching experience as a public servant.

While defence is often seen as male dominated field, increasingly women's views in defence and security issues are crucial and adds value in the current security challenges including in humanitarian aid and disaster relief and countering terrorism to name a few. Through personal observations and interactions with colleagues and counterparts alike, the sharing of ideas, listening to broader perspectives and learning from experiences is far more important.

With your expertise being in your current field, where does your responsibility start and where does it end?

Among the main roles of the Institute is to contribute towards well informed decision policy which requires us to provide research papers and analytical inputs on issues with implications to Brunei and of interest to MINDEF and RBAF. In this regard, part of my responsibility is to ensure the papers produced are of rich analytical standards. This involves meaningful conversations among the researchers within the Institute and also exchanges with colleagues from relevant directorates in MINDEF, RBAF and other relevant local agencies as well as regional and international think tanks and institutions.

Being a woman is it easier to carry out your responsibility or do you think otherwise?

Our line of work is not gender specific, those with the relevant qualifications and experience as well as dedication should be able to carry out the responsibility. Research outcomes and its impact is not usually tangible, direct or clear. It is an ongoing process of acquiring knowledge and building the capability of researchers and think tank as a whole takes time.

How has your time in SHHBIDSS and MINDEF in general developed in terms of equal opportunities for men and women?

Within the ten years being in MINDEF, I see that there have been equal opportunities for all officers. In my own experience, I have had the chance to work with remarkable men and women in the organisation.

I am most appreciative of the long-standing commitment of MINDEF in developing professionalism by ensuring its human resource assets are provided the best of opportunities to grow for the betterment of the organisation. It has certainly been beneficial to us in the Institute and myself personally.

SHHBIDSS as the only Brunei think tank on defence and strategic issues, has been afforded opportunities made possible with MINDEF's ongoing support. The Institute and its officers are able to develop and gain experiences through work attachments in the RSIS, Singapore and various courses and programmes including in the APCSS in Hawaii, US.

Will women play a bigger role in the future generation of leadership for RBAF & MINDEF?

I do believe women will continue to have a place in MINDEF. We have seen appointments of outstanding women as members in the Defence Executive in the past. And today, a number are holding senior and middle management posts as well. This could equally be said for the RBAF's female military officers too. Hence, I see the future generation of women to play a bigger role in running defence. With positive attitudes and strong support network particularly among women themselves, it is rewarding working in defence.

What advice do you offer to women who pursue a career path with MINDEF & RBAF?

I learnt that commitment is a must, willingness to learn and being adaptive is important and upholding inner values of integrity and sincerity is key in carrying out our duties and responsibility whether in MINDEF or RBAF and elsewhere in life.

azveen Kaur Saggu, Executive Officer at the Ministry of Defence was selected by the Embassy of the United States of America in Brunei Darussalam to participate and represent Brunei Darussalam in the U.S. Department of State's premier professional exchange program, the International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP) in the United States of America from 24 September 2018 to 12 October 2018.

Mazveen Kaur Saggu was selected based on her exemplification of strong leadership, as well as her professional relationship with the U.S. Embassy's Office of Defence Cooperation.

The program, entitled "ASEAN: Security Challenges" saw a participation of eight current and emerging international leaders from ASEAN countries, which include Brunei Darussalam, Malaysia, Republic of Indonesia, Republic of the Philippines, Kingdom of Thailand, Vietnam, Laos and Myanmar. The threeweeks program began in Washington DC and included stops in Chicago, San Francisco before finally ending in Honolulu.

Throughout the program, Mazveen was not only able to learn from her U.S. and

ASEAN Counterparts, but also played a significant role in sharing her knowledge, perspectives and experiences in a diplomatic, professional and immaculate nature during discussions, as well as represent Brunei Darussalam in a very positive light. During the program, she was also appointed by her ASEAN peers to represent the team as team leader during their final meeting.

Mazveen strongly believes that the program has contributed to her professional development,

as well as expanded and strengthened her professional network with other professionals from the participating countries.

Mazveen Kaur Saggu is also the recipient of the Excellent Employee Civil Award in 2018, and participated in the 2nd Brunei Top 100 Leaders Program where she graduated with a platinum award.

Throughout the 5-year degree course, in addition to undergoing medical modules and military training, she took courses in Army Medicine, Aviation Medicine, Naval Medicine and Battlefield Medicine, including Tactical Combat Casualty Care and Casualty Evacuation (CASEVAC).



She also received a Book Prize Award for achieving the best results in the Obstetrics and Gynecology discipline. She graduated during the NDUM's 9th annual convocation ceremony at Putrajaya International Convention Centre, and was honoured to received her scroll

wo female senior officers of the Royal Brunei Armed Forces (RBAF) received the OBOE Endeavour Award at the Defence Academy. The award recipients were 643 Lieutenant Colonel Norsuriati bte Haji Sharbini, 618 Commander Norharirayati bte Yakub,

The OBOE Endeavour Award is an Academic Excellence Program from the Australian Government that is awarded to RBAF Officers who have graduated with outstanding results during the Command and Staff Course. These officers met with key Australian Defence Force leaders, Australian military base, and participated in educational and cultural activities, as well as engage in dialogues and discussions. The program aimed to impart knowledge to the RBAF officers about Australia and its Defence Force, share commonalities on the region's security and interest, as well as to build stronger relationship between the armed forces. This will further enhance the bilateral defence relations between Brunei Darussalam and Australia.

The name 'OBOE Endeavour Award' was chosen to commemorate Australian Defence Force's contribution to the successful liberation of Borneo from the Japanese occupation during Operation OBOE in World War II, which marked the beginning of Brunei Darussalam and Australia's defence relationship.

Realistically, this is a very complex and difficult task to achieve. Only through such support from the PRU team will there be progress.

In January 2018, I received my posting order to Chemical Biological Radiological and Explosives (CBRE) Defence Unit as Combat Engineer Search Advisor (CESA)/ Search Troop Commander. As the very first female to be posted in this specialist unit as a troop commander, of course I had mix feelings, excited to experience this soon-to-be chaotic routine and at the same time more feelings of anxiety on what is ahead of me. The first two months were quite a challenge to me, especially in terms of command and fitness. Looking at where I was before back when I was only managing engineer's equipment, compare to what I'm doing now having my own troop and also managing specialist's equipment, the gap in between was quite huge that I believe if only I halt for a second, I might not be able to catch the time. As time goes by, and especially after attending the Engineer Commander Course (Chemical Biological and Radiological Defense) in Singapore where I got to experience as the only female in the batch, I gained more confidents in every decision I made.

I still remember when I mentioned that I wanted to be an engineer that time specifically as a Field Engineer when I was just signed in to this organization, I was laughed by a few crowds that believed there is no place for woman in combatant field. I thought so too, never because of sexism, but because I believe that every Ulul Amri has to be a man. Yet, that did not stop me from contributing my capability to this organization. There will be times you will be looked down at just for being a female, be humble but never let your dignity off, chin up and show them that you are not just an ordinary female.
